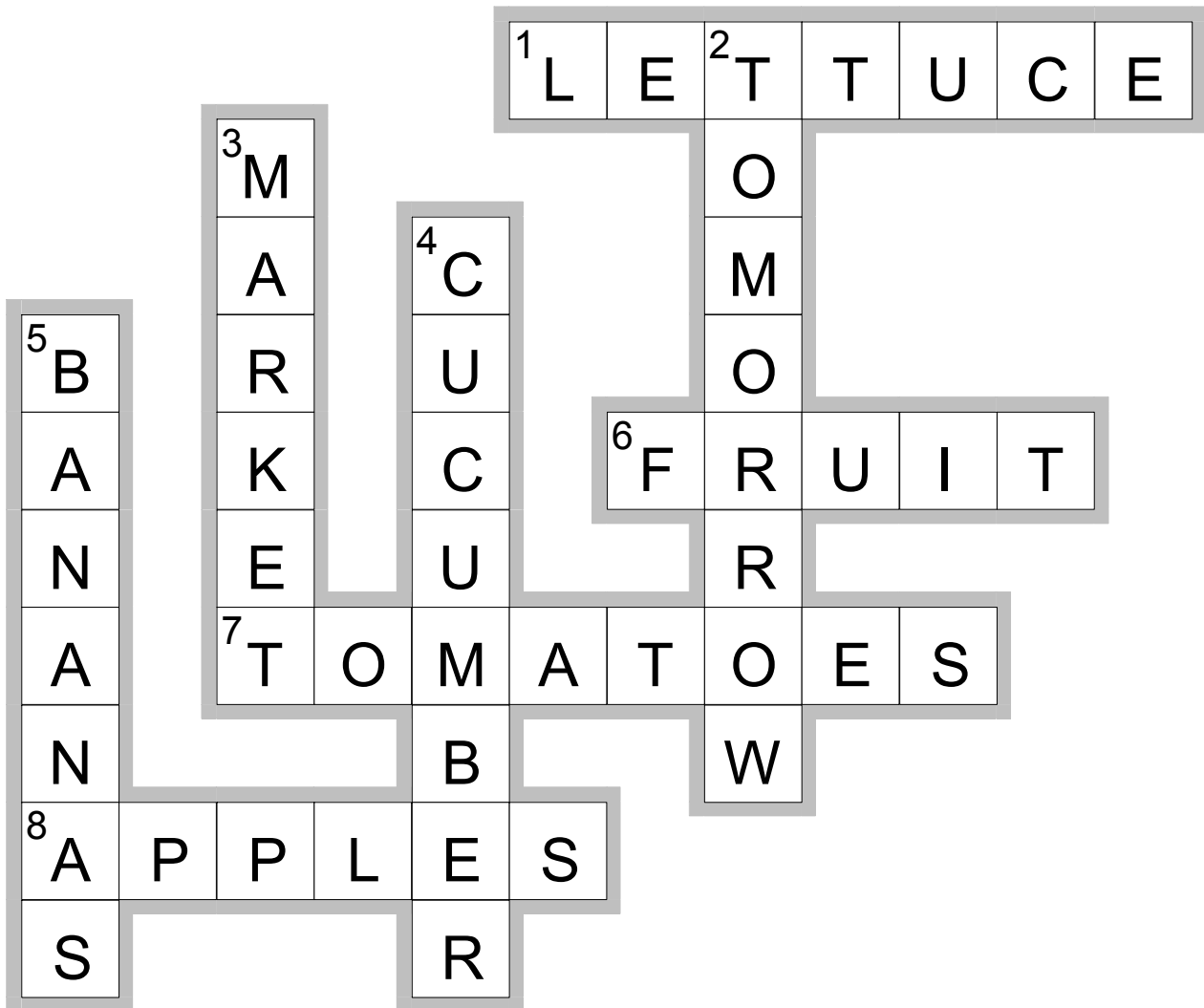
- **Emboldened** words and chunks indicate *colloquial* language use.
- Underlined words and chunks indicate shortened words.
- Words and chunks as ^{superscript} indicate *standard* language which is absent.
- For the sake of readability, not all words have been spelled to mimic the accent; for example, dropped 'h' and abbreviated words. Draw attention to these features for the learners.

Can the learners identify that Carol's father has problems with his hearing? This can be identified from (a) the unusually long pauses when Carol has stopped speaking and is waiting for a response (b) an excessive amount of repetition (c) her father's use of 'eh?' because he hasn't heard her.
